





Core Curriculum

The Core Curriculum at Ashland University:

The word "core" comes from the Latin cor (heart). As its name suggests, a core curriculum is the heart of a university education. Just as the heart is essential to the life of the body, a core is essential to a good education. This education is the kind we have had for centuries. It is called a "liberal" education, also from Latin, for freedom. A liberally educated person learns how to think clearly, read carefully, write coherently, speak persuasively and listen thoughtfully, which are all valuable skills. Yet, while a part and effect of liberal education, acquiring information and skills is not its goal. Liberal education aims to produce people who are free in the sense that they can think for themselves about the most important questions in life. A liberal education core centers on an important question for everyone: What does it mean to be a good human being? A liberally educated person continues to explore this question and others that emerge from it throughout his or her life.

Principle 1

As the centerpiece of liberal education, the Core exists to cultivate the mind and ennoble the heart, which is good in itself and can enable students to enrich the professions, promote the public good and thrive in the broader world.

Principle 2

The Core's focus is to free the mind from prejudicial attachment to unreflected opinion by encouraging students to pursue free, Socratic inquiry about the most important questions for them as human beings and citizens, regardless of major or profession. In pursuing these questions, Core courses will empower students to think freely and critically about questions concerning wisdom, ethics, justice, society, culture, language, nature, science, beauty, religion and the past.


Principle 3

Generally speaking, Core courses will be participatory and focused on how facts and theories help to deepen understanding of the question under study. Students will also learn how to think clearly, read carefully, write coherently, speak persuasively and listen thoughtfully.

Library Spaces & Services

- **Computers** are available on every floor of the library. Students may use computers to conduct research, write papers, prepare presentations, or for any other personal or academic tasks. The building also offers a variety of group and individual study spaces.
- The Instructional Resource Center (IRC), located on the library's second floor, supports the Dwight Schar College of Education and is a self-service work area for students, faculty and staff. Second floor collections include juvenile books (picture books, fiction, non-fiction and YA), big books, award books and leveled book kits; IRC Collection items feature K-12 curriculum textbooks, activity books and manipulatives. IRC technology resources include computers, scanners and printing. Laminating, binding, button makers, Ellison Die Cut Machines and an extensive library of dies are available at a reasonable cost. Help is available in-person and online via the Ask the IRC Chat.
- The library has two campus FindMe printers providing students with access to printing, scanning and copying. Students can check out headphones, calculators and dry erase board supplies to use with whiteboards located in the study rooms and mobile whiteboards located throughout the library. Study room reservations may be made using our online reservation system.

Research Resources

- The library's membership in OhioLINK gives access to materials at colleges and universities across Ohio. Requested items are delivered at no charge in three to five business days. Nationwide interlibrary loan is available for items not accessible via OhioLINK.
- Archer Library's catalog includes the physical materials for Archer Library and ATS Library and provides access to many eResources, including journals and government documents. Materials can be checked out of both libraries using your EagleCard.
- The library's A to Z database list offers 195 research databases, providing access to thousands of journals, magazines, newspapers and media. Archer Library is also an Ohio and Government Documents depository.
- The Archer Library catalog, research databases and eBooks are accessible off campus using a simple authentication process.

What is the Writing & Communication Center (WCC)?

When working with students, coaches approach communication as a complex and individualized process. The WCC's primary objective is to help students become more aware, autonomous and confident communicators.

Process Approach

At the WCC, we approach communication as a process, not just an end product. This means that you don't have to wait until you have a finished product to come to the WCC for help. With us, you can brainstorm, think out loud about what you're working on and discuss your approach to an assignment. After that, we can help you think about your organization and next steps for the assignment.

Other Services

Beyond one-on-one coaching sessions, the Writing and Communication Center (WCC) offers a dynamic range of services designed to enrich the academic and creative lives of our students. Our Embedded Coach Program places skilled coaches directly into classes, offering tailored support and fostering a deeper understanding of course material. Additionally, our guest speaker events and workshops provide unique opportunities to engage with experts and thought leaders, expanding perspectives and sparking inspiration. We also host contests that challenge and celebrate the creativity and prowess of our student body, making the WCC a hub of vibrant academic and creative activity on campus.

• FERPA Information



Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) Information

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) is a federal law designed to protect the privacy of a student's educational, financial and health records. Without the appropriate student information releases, student account and academic records cannot be discussed with a parent, guardian, spouse or other parties. Under the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, student education records and information cannot be released without the expressed written consent of the student. The written consent needs to contain specifically what is to be released, the reasons for release and to whom (for example, a transcript).

The exception to this information is classified as "Directory (Public) Information" and may be released without the student's consent. Ashland University has determined the following as directory information:

- a. Name, local address; home address; local telephone number; home telephone number; date and place of birth; parent names and address; email address; major; class; center attended; dates of attendance; full-time, half-time or part-time status (not specific credit hours); degrees and awards received (including Dean's List); previous institutions attended; participation in officially recognized activities and sports; photographs; weight and height of members of athletic teams.
- b. Directory information cannot include student identification numbers or social security numbers. Ashland University sends names and social security numbers of enrolled students to the National Student Loan Clearinghouse each semester. In addition, the university is required by law to release enrolled student social security numbers and addresses to agencies connected with The U.S. Department of Education when mandated to do so.
- c. Students have the right to withhold the release of the above by presenting a written request to the Registrar. A small number of students have requested this and when the name is "accessed in the computer" the statement "Do Not Release Information" will appear.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 as amended, outlines the requirements regarding the privacy of student records. FERPA governs release of records maintained by an educational institution and access to those records. The following explains the rights of students to the student education records and outlines the university's procedures to comply with FERPA.

The meaning of "education records" is, with certain exemptions as listed below, those records, files, documents and other materials which contain information directly related to a student, and are maintained by any employee or agent of the university. The following categories of information are exempted and are not considered to be "education records:"

- a. Records made by university personnel which are in the sole possession of the maker and are not accessible or revealed to any other person.
- b. Records maintained by the Safety Services Department for law enforcement purposes.
- c. Medical and counseling records used solely for treatment. (Medical records may be personally reviewed by a physician of the student's choice.)
- d. Records only related to a former student (alumni records). Records of that individual while a student continue to be considered education records.

All records pertaining to students which are maintained by university offices are official university records, and as such, remain the property of the university.

A student has the right to:

A. Inspect and review education records pertaining to the student.

- a. Students have the right to view their education records wherever these records are maintained on campus.
- b. Once a student has submitted a request to inspect his or her records, an institution must comply within 45 days.
- c. Information contained in education records will be fully explained and interpreted to students by university personnel assigned to, and designated by, the appropriate office.
- d. Students have the right to review only their own records. When a record contains information about more than one student, disclosure cannot include information regarding the other student(s).
- e. The university allows inspection and review of the specified requested education records, but does not permit a copy of said records. No photographic, electronic or audio devices are permitted during the inspection and review meeting.

- f. When the student has an outstanding financial or other hold on records, the student still maintains the right to review his or her education records. He or she does not have the right to obtain any copies of those records unless failure to do so would effectively deny the student the right to inspect and review records. Also, that student does not have the right to have a transcript sent to a third party until the obligation is fulfilled
- g. In cases where a student is not within commuting distance (50 miles) of campus and therefore is physically unable to be present to view the record on campus, the institution must make arrangements for the student to obtain access for review of these records

B. Challenge Information in Records

- a. Students have a right to challenge the content of their education records if they consider the information contained therein to be inaccurate, misleading or inappropriate.
- b. This process includes an opportunity for amendment of the records or insertion of written explanations by the student into such records.
- c. The right to challenge grades does not apply under the Act unless the grade assigned was inaccurately recorded, under which condition the record will be corrected.

C. Procedures for Hearing to Challenge Records

- a. Students challenging information in their records must submit, in writing, a request for a hearing to the appropriate office maintaining the record, listing the specific information in question and the reasons for the challenge.
- b. Hearings will be conducted by a university official who does not have a direct interest in the outcome of the hearing.
- c. Students shall be afforded a full and fair opportunity to present evidence relevant to the reasons for the challenge.
- d. The hearing officer will render a decision, in writing, noting the reason and summarizing all evidence presented within a reasonable period of time after the challenge is filed.
- e. Should the hearing be in favor of the student, the record shall be amended accordingly. Should the request be denied, an appeal may be made, in writing, and submitted to the University Registrar within 10 days of the student's notification of the decision of the hearing officer. The appeal shall be heard by an Appeals Board of three disinterested senior university officials and a decision rendered, in writing, within a reasonable period of time.
- f. Should the appeal be in favor of the student, the record shall be amended, accordingly. Should the request be denied, the student may choose to place a statement with the record commenting on the accuracy of the information in the record and/or setting forth any basis for inaccuracy. When disclosed to an authorized party, the record will always include the student's statement and notice of the Board's decision, as long as the student's record is maintained by the university.
- **D. Limit disclosure of some "personally identifiable information"** (information that would directly identify the student or make the student's identity easily traceable) known as directory information.
 - a. Any student who does not want directory information to be released must submit their request in writing and meet with the campus FERPA Coordinator located in the Registrar's Office.
- **E.** The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by Ashland University to comply with the requirements of FERPA by contacting the Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education.

Fall statements will be mailed mid-July. Please be advised that if the student has not filled out a FERPA form, our offices will only be able to discuss account information with the student. This release form can be found at ashlandcentral.etrieve.cloud/Index#/form/34

Please remember that Federal Aid will not be applied to your account until 10 days prior to the start of classes, providing all paperwork has been completed. Please subtract pending aid from your account balance when calculating your payment amount. If you notice anticipated aid is not listed, please contact the Financial Aid Office at 419-289-5002 or email finaid@ashland.edu.

Payment Options:

- Payments made by mail: Please note Student ID in memo, send check made payable to Ashland University to Student Accounts, Ashland University, 401 College Ave., Ashland, OH 44805.
- Electronic checks will be assessed \$.75 service Fee.
- Credit/debit card payments will be assessed a 2.95% nonrefundable service fee of the total transaction amount.
- Payment Plan Touchnet provides student with an option to pay for the education over five, four and three months. There is a \$25 enrollment fee and \$25 late charge, however no interest charge.

Student Health Insurance:

All full-time undergraduate students are required to have health insurance and are automatically enrolled in the major medical portion of Ashland University's insurance. Students have the option to waive the university's coverage if they are currently covered by an individual or family coverage plan. Students need to complete the online waiver each academic year at www.studentinsurance.com/client/1469. Paper waivers will not be accepted. Please note: The medical insurance waiver will be available after July 1 and must be completed by September 1, annually.

Important Information:

- Paper statements will only be mailed for the initial fall and spring billings. Students will
 receive an email each month if they have an unpaid balance. Students can view their
 account balance online at any time.
- All student account charges must be covered before any student can move into any university facility.
- Interest will be charged on all past due balances at a rate of 1.5% per month.
- Only students with a balance under \$1,000 will be allowed to register for subsequent semesters
- Students with unpaid balances will not receive their diplomas.
- No person may have an official transcript until their account is paid in full.
- Student employee paychecks can be picked up biweekly in the Student Accounts Office. Direct deposit is highly encouraged.
- Students can electronically consent to receive their federal tax forms online through Self Service.

Financial Aid

We're here to guide you through the steps to secure financial aid.

Paying for college can be challenging, but when you choose Ashland University, you choose a team that works on your behalf every step of the way. Approximately 98% of undergraduate students receive financial aid at Ashland University. We've done our best to ensure Ashland University is affordable for students who want to attend. In addition to our four-year tuition freeze, we also offer financial aid resources to all students who are admitted to the university and meet eligibility requirements. The Ashland Promise provides an affordable education through offering many forms of financial aid, including scholarships, grants, loans and student employment.

Financial Aid Steps

- 1. **Apply** Complete your FAFSA using Ashland University's school code 003012. You and your parent(s) will each be prompted to create your own FSA ID when you log on to the FAFSA site and you will use that FSA ID to sign your completed FAFSA.
- 2. **Review Financial Aid Offer** Students can log in to Self Service at selfservice.ashland.edu and click on the Financial Aid tab to see just how affordable it can be to receive a nationally recognized private education at AU! Check your AU email account frequently for revised offers, eligibility requirements and important notices from the Financial Aid Office.
- 3. **Complete Loan Processes** For any federal loans listed on your Financial Aid Offer, you must login to Self-Service and accept or decline the loans. Additionally, federal loan borrowing requirements must be completed before the loan will disburse to your student account. If you wish to cancel or reduce any of your loans, please email the Financial Aid Office at financialaid@ashland.edu.

Financial Aid FAQs

What determines my financial aid eligibility?

There are a variety of factors that are considered when AU offers financial aid to students, including:

- High School GPA
- ACT and/or SAT Scores
- FAFSA Results
- Departmental Selection of Scholarship Recipients

What financial aid options are available?

Once we receive your FAFSA and eligibility is determined, you will automatically be considered for any federal/state grants, loans and student employment. While you will want to apply for any scholarships that are available in your local area, Ashland University offers merit and need-based scholarships to assist with your educational costs. Make sure you contact your major department to inquire about additional funding opportunities.

Additionally, parents of dependent students may apply for a Federal Parent PLUS Loan up to the student's cost of attendance, less other financial aid received. Students who need more loan funds than what has already been awarded in federal loans can apply for a private education alternative loan.

When will financial aid disburse?

If we've received all required paperwork, aid will disburse to your account before the beginning of the term to which it applies. Please note: Federal aid and private education loans aren't credited to your account until 10 days before each term begins. If you are eligible for a refund, it will be available after you attend your first class or complete an academic activity in an online course.

We know that each student situation is unique and we are here to make the process of funding your education as smooth as possible. Please contact the AU Financial Aid Office with any questions.

How Does the EagleCard work with Dining Services?



A four-week menu cycle allows students to use their meal plan at more than 10 different points of service. The goal of Student Dining Services is to appeal to today's more discriminating student, whose tastes range from fast food to a more traditional style. The intent is to provide a menu that is geared toward "just in time" cooking presentation. This allows the student customers to select what they want and how they want it.

Meal Plan Options

Gold Plan - \$3,135 per semester

Unlimited meals in the student dining hall plus \$275 Dining Dollars which can be used to purchase guest meals in the dining hall or used as cash at any of the retail dining locations on campus. This plan allows you to take family and friends to the dining hall while experiencing tremendous savings over the door price. Dining dollars can only be used in dining locations on campus. Dining dollars expire at the end of each semester and do not carry over.

Purple Plan - \$2,845 per semester

Unlimited meals in the student dining hall located in the John C. Meyers Convocation center. Students may come and go as many times as they want. You will never run out of meals! The dining hall now offers late night dining, which makes this plan a great value.

Talon Plan - \$2,845 per semester

Receive 160 meals to be used in the student dining hall plus an additional \$500 dining dollars to be used at any of our retail locations which includes Eagles' Nest, Tuffy's Smoothie Bar, Lyceum Cafe, Concessions and Ashland Marketplace.

Eagle Plan - \$2,845 per semester

This plan gives the student 240 meals to be spread throughout the semester. Meal swipes can be used at the student dining hall or used as equivalency at any of our retail locations, which include the Eagles' Nest, Tuffy's Smoothie Bar, Concessions and Catering.

Tuffy Plan - \$1,145 per semester (only for commuters or students living in senior apts) Students receive 80 meals to be used in the dining hall or used for equivalency at the Eagles' Nest, Tuffy's Smoothie Bar and Concessions.



FOOD PANTRY

Nationally, 1 in 3 college students experience food insecurity. This statistic may seem surprising to some, but the cost of tuition, fees, textbooks, housing, and other personal expenses and circumstances make food stability sometimes difficult to navigate; especially when colleges are closed for breaks and students no longer have access to dining facilities or meal plans. By opening a food pantry on campus, our hope is to help alleviate some of this burden specifically for Ashland University students.

How to Use the Food Pantry

- Students will complete a brief form on their first visit. Students must be currently enrolled in classes at Ashland University to utilize the food pantry.
- Students will present their AU ID for each visit.
- Reusable shopping bags will be provided on the first visit. Students will be expected to bring the reusable shopping bag with them on future visits.
- Students will be able to shop in the food pantry for non-perishable food and personal hygiene items.
- Students are responsible for reading all ingredient labels to make sure a personal allergen in not present before consuming food or using personal hygiene items.

Clicks

A "click" system is one of the best ways to describe and manage the multiple ways to print documents. Students are allotted 400 clicks per semester and an additional 100 clicks during finals week. These reset at the end of the semester and do not roll over.

- 1 click = 1 page of single or double-sided black and white printing
- 2 clicks = 1 page of single-sided color printing
- 4 clicks = 1 page of double-sided color printing

How to add more clicks

Additional clicks can be purchased in the Campus Store at 5 cents per page.

What if I have problems with my personal computer?

Passwords expire every two years.

Recommendations from the IT Department:

• Change your password Ashland University uses an AD password system. This means that nearly every AU system will use the same username and password. To increase the security of all accounts, passwords expire every two years.

Information Technology recommends that you back up your essential data often. This can be done using OneDrive, flash drives, external hard drives and by saving multiple copies of your work just in case.

Lock Your Computer

To enhance the security of your computer, the Information Technology department recommends that you look after your equipment even when it is running in your residence hall. All full-time students entering Ashland University are required to submit a completed Medical History Form and Immunization Record to the Student Health Center (SHC) prior to the start of classes. Students must visit www.medproctor.com to complete the required information.

Students experience many firsts when going away to school. Managing your own health care is commonly one of them. The primary focus of the Student Health Center is to enhance the academic success of our students by providing high quality medical care and promoting healthy lifestyles that encourage lifelong health and wellbeing.

Excessive stress may be a key element in nearly half of all illness. Stressful times are normal and manageable. Feel free to contact the Student Health Center for assistance.

Who is eligible to use the services of the Student Health Center?

- All full-time students, regardless of insurance coverage (part-time students are not eligible for Student Health Center services)
- · Appointments are required

Student Health Center Fee and Services Offered

Cost for Student Health Center services for undergraduates is covered by the Student Access fee noted on your tuition statement once per semester. Full-time graduate students are not automatically billed, but charged the fee at the time of their first visit each semester. Services included in fee:

- All Visits Nurse, Nurse Practitioner, Physician
- · Assessment, diagnosis and treatment of minor illness and injury
- · Onsite lab testing in the SHC: strep, mono, pregnancy, urinalysis, etc., when indicated
- Commonly prescribed medication and over-the-counter medication, when indicated
- Flu shots, as long as supply available
- Women's Health STI screening, Pap Smears, contraceptive management, etc.
- Continuation of allergy programs, as directed by student's allergist
 - You must receive your initial injection with your allergist.
 - Your allergist must provide the allergy serum and send documentation of your orders with specific instruction for administration.
 - You must schedule an appointment with the SHC to receive your injection.
 - You must wait a minimum of 20 minutes in the SHC after your injection. If your allergist requires longer wait times, the allergist's request will be followed.
- University-required accident insurance
- Assistance with completion and submission of insurance claims

Are additional fees charged for any services at Student Health Center?

- Immunizations Exact fee depends on cost of vaccine at the time of injection
- Tetanus/Pertussis booster (Tdap), one injection
- Hepatitis B, series of three injections (over six months)
- TB tests

Costs are based on current pricing and are subject to change.

- Laboratory testing sent to off-campus labs, (i.e. blood tests, urine or wound cultures, etc.). The fee for these labs can be paid by cash, check, credit card, Eagle Dollars, or it can be billed to your health insurance. The exact fee is controlled by Quest Laboratories.
- Radiology X-rays, ultrasounds, MRIs and CT scans, which are ordered by our nurse practitioner or physician, will need to be done at an outside provider such as Ohio Health or UH Samaritan Medical Center. These tests will be billed to your health insurance.
- Physical Exams any physical including work, College of Nursing and Health Sciences, international students, etc., are \$30.

Confidentiality

• All business conducted within the Student Health Center is completely confidential.

Student Health Center

- State and Federal Law prohibits the release of any health-related information without the patient's signed consent.
- Release of Information forms are available in the Student Health Center and on the Student Health Center website. These forms are valid for 90 days from the date of signature and specific to medical information approved for release by the patient.

What should I do when the Student Health Center is closed?

- When possible (non-emergency), wait until the Health Center is open to schedule an appointment.
- · Visit a walk-in clinic/urgent care center. There are currently three clinics in Ashland.


Available August 1st, reserving your textbooks online through the campus store website, www.ashlandbookstore.com, will:

You may use the Campus Store online tool to look up and purchase required textbooks and course materials.



- 1. Register and log on to the Campus Store's website, www.ashlandbookstore.com.
- 2. Hover over "Textbooks" from the home page. When the drop down menu appears, select "Textbooks" from the list.
- 3. On the new page, use your schedule to input information in the "select term," "select department," and "select course and section" menus.
- 4. Once you have found your class, select "add course." The course will then appear on "Your Current Course List." Repeat this process until all of your courses are on that list. Once the list is complete, select "Get Course Materials."
- 5. The next screen will show you all of the books for your classes.
- 6. Some books will say "REQUIRED" and in that case you must have that textbook.
- 7. Others may say "OPTIONAL" and those are not required, but recommended.
- 8. Finally, some might say "PICK A FORMAT." In that case there are likely a few forms of the book available, such as bundle packs or student value editions.
- 9. Note: Not all courses require textbooks; if your class does not, it will say "This course does not require any course materials."
- 10. In the white boxes, you will see the prices and formats of the textbook as available from the Campus Store. To reserve one, select "add to cart." Follow this process for all of your courses.
- 11. Once you have made selections for each course, select "Shopping Cart" from the top of the page.
- 12. On this page you will be able to select the format of the textbook you would like.
- 13. "Used Preferred" means that you would like a used copy but will take a new textbook if there aren't any used ones available.
- 14. "New Preferred" means that you would like a new copy but will accept a used copy if that is the only book available.
- 15. Under "order summary," select whether you are picking up or shipping your order.
- 16. Select "payment type" and fill in payment information.
- 17. Check order.

The department is staffed by a director, administrative assistant, dispatchers, officers and interns. Located on the first floor in the Hawkins-Conard Student Center, the Safety Services Department operates **24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year**. Around-the-clock service is provided by a dispatcher and at least one uniformed, unarmed officer and/or interns conducting foot and/or vehicle patrols.

Safety Service officers not only enforce university policies, they aid the local police in the enforcement of state and local statutes for incidents that may occur on campus. Officers do not have arrest authority, but are trained in emergency first aid and CPR and respond to medical, fire and other emergencies. Safety Services also enforces traffic and parking regulations; conducts crime investigations; and handles routine service calls, such as registration and distribution of parking permits; assists motorists with jump starts and lockouts; codes ID access cards; monitors access security and fire alarm systems and provides crime prevention and other safety seminars.

Parking Permits

Parking Permits:

Students who are enrolled at Ashland University are required to secure a permit for their vehicle if they plan to park on campus. Students who reside off campus and attend classes before 5 p.m. on weekdays are considered commuter students and must also register their vehicle with Safety Services. Residential students are permitted to have only one vehicle on campus at a time. Each permit is registered to a specific vehicle, and may not be moved to a different vehicle. If a student changes vehicles, they will need to register for a new permit. The charge for a new permit is \$2.

The cost for a permit is \$95 per year for the first permit. This fee is charged directly to the student's Ashland University account. Commuter students who wish to register an additional vehicle may do so for a fee of \$2 per vehicle (up to a total of three vehicles) upon showing proof of registration.

Student Mail Boxes:

Each residential student is assigned a mailbox number that they will keep as long as they live on campus. Students are required to live on campus unless they qualify for commuter status. Commuter status exceptions can be found in the Student Handbook.



Athletics FAQS

What is NCAA Division II?

In addition to the purposes and fundamental policy of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, as set forth in Constitution 1, members of Division II believe that a well-conducted intercollegiate athletics program, based on sound educational principles and practices, is a proper part of the educational mission of a university or college and that the educational wellbeing and academic success of the participating student-athlete is of primary concern. There are approximately 300 institutions competing on the NCAA Division II level.

What is the Great Midwest Athletic Conference?

The Great Midwest Athletic Conference, established in 2011, consists of 13 private, nonprofit member institutions and sponsors 26 conference championship sport offerings.

Current members of the Great Midwest include Ashland University, Cedarville University, University of Findlay, Hillsdale College, Kentucky Wesleyan College, Lake Erie College, Malone University, Northwood University, Ohio Dominican University, Thomas More University, Tiffin University, Ursuline College and Walsh University.

Where do the Eagles play?

Ashland University's facilities are among the best in NCAA Division II. In recent years, Ashland has added softball's new Deb Miller Field at the Archer Ballpark Complex and the multi-purpose Niss Athletic Center, one of the top indoor facilities in the country, as well as the renovated Tomassi Baseball Stadium and Donges Field at the Archer Ballpark Complex. What do incoming student-athletes need to do to be eligible for competition?

What is Ashland's athletics ticket information?

Ashland has seven ticketed sports - football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, wrestling, indoor track/field and STUNT. All other sporting events are free. Gates open one hour prior to all ticketed events; except football (90 minutes). Ticket prices are as follows:

- Basketball: \$16 reserved, \$11 adult, \$6 students and seniors
- Football: \$15 reserved, \$10 adult, \$5 students and seniors
- Volleyball: \$12 reserved, \$10 adult, \$5 students and seniors
- Wrestling: \$11 adult, \$6 students and seniors
- STUNT: \$10 adult, \$5 students and seniors

Pre-paid tickets can be purchased through the Campus Store at 419-289-5336. For group ticketing, call 419-289-5442. For will call and general ticketing information, call 419-289-5441. Prices are subject to change.

An athlete may receive up to four complimentary admissions per HOME contest. Room Assignments

Students must complete a housing application at www.housing.ashland.edu. Housing assignments and roommate information will be emailed to your ashland.edu email account by mid- to late July.

First-year students are generally placed with a roommate based on similar lifestyles such as cleanliness and sleep habits. Students who would like to search for a possible roommate may do so through the Roomeez feature at www.housing.ashland.edu. Students may choose to create a profile on Roomeez to find other students with similar lifestyle preferences and interests. Instructional documents are linked on our web page, ashland.edu/housing. There are also instructions on how to request a specific roommate. Roommate requests must be mutual to be granted. Students living in Honors or on Ashbrook floors may only request a roommate within their same program.

Move-In

- New residential students will move in on Friday, August 23rd.
- Residence Life will send out specific information regarding move-in schedules, where to pick up your keys, and what to bring. Be sure to check your AU email for that information!
- Students must submit an early arrival application at www.housing.ashland.edu if they plan to arrive before August 23, 2024. It is \$25 per day to arrive to campus before the designated move in date; if your early arrival application is not filled out, an additional charge of \$50 will be applied to the student's account.
- See the Move-In Parking Lot Map in the front cover of this guidebook for move-in instructions.
- Students are encouraged to verify that their student accounts are cleared with the Business Office. This means that all fees and charges must be paid in full or arrangements made before any student can reside in university facilities.

Residence Hall Information

Furnishings - There is a bed, desk, chair, chest of drawers and closet space for each student. Drapes or blinds are also furnished in each room. All university furniture must remain in the rooms.

Laundry - Laundry facilities are located in each residence hall. A standard service fee is applied to every student's bill that covers the use of the machines; no quarters needed.

Security - Ashland has a full-time Safety Services Department located on campus that is accessible to all students anytime. All residence halls have swipe access; each student is required to use their student ID to gain access to their residence hall. Propping outside doors is a violation of university policy. All community members should see that residence hall entrances are properly secured behind them once they enter residential buildings. Students should keep their rooms locked at all times. Residents are encouraged to purchase safes for valuable items and any medications they may have, as well as purchase renter's insurance.

Resident Assistants - Resident Assistants (RA) are undergraduate peers trained in community development and crisis management. Their various duties focus on the development of a secure floor and hall community. Each RA is responsible for organizing social and educational floor events, being trained in conflict resolution activities, responding to crisis, serving as a referral source and assisting with the adjustment issues that face new and returning students.

Residence Life Coordinators (RLCs) - Professional staff who supervise RAs and oversee the day-to-day operations of residence hall facilities. They serve as Student Conduct hearing officers for residence hall disciplinary incidents. They assist with crisis situations and participate in an on-call duty schedule with other RLCs.

Housing Requirements

All full-time undergraduate students (registered for 12 or more hours per semester) are required to live on campus. Students who started their undergraduate classes at Ashland University in Fall 2023, and following semesters, will have a 3 year live-on requirement. Students will be required to live on campus for a total of 6 Fall and Spring semesters or have completed 90 credit hours at an accredited college/university, as verified by Ashland University Registrar. Students who wish to live off campus will need to apply for off campus status through Residence Life. Undergraduate students who started at Ashland University prior to Fall 2023 must live on campus for all 4 years unless the student meets one of the housing exemption policies outlined in the Student Handbook.

The Saturday Shopper Shuttle

The Shopper Shuttle is a transportation service available every Saturday from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. It makes continuous 60-minute loops around the city of Ashland, stopping at locations such as Save-A-Lot, Dollar General, Buehlers, Wal-Mart and Hawkins. Additional stops along the route may be made upon request. The cost of this service is \$5 for an all-day pass. The campus stop is in the Bixler parking lot across from the Student Center.

Airport Transportation

Please call Ashland Public Transit dispatch at 419-207-8240 to schedule your ride. Ashland Transit Company now offers services to the three major airports. Trips to Cleveland Hopkins and Akron-Canton Airport both cost \$75 for one person. Any additional passengers will pay \$10 each. Trips to Columbus Airport cost \$100 for one person and \$10 for each additional passenger. All fees must be paid in advance and service must be requested at least two days prior.




